
The missing steps in front of the Pump Room

Many of you will know that Friends of Pittville are involved in 'The Masterplan Project' in conjunction with Cheltenham Borough Council. Part of this project involves the reinstatement of the steps in front of the Pump Room in the position shown in the photograph below, taken pre-1900.

The good news is that The Masterplan Steps Project can go ahead! We have received the offer of a grant from the Enovert Community Trust (which uses landfill tax money) for £40,000 which, with other grants, including from the Cheltenham Borough Council Jubilee Fund, plus some accumulated FoP fundraising money, will cover the cost of reinstating the set of steps.

The steps, at the top of the grassed area between the two remaining plinths, were first installed at the same time the Pump Room was built in the 1820s. They helped set off the view between the Pump Room and the lake. However, they disappeared in around 1900 when the bandstand was temporarily placed on top of them.

The project will reinstate the four Forest of Dean sandstone steps, renovate the plinths and landscape the surroundings. FoP are in partnership with CBC on this project and it is the Council that will undertake the tendering process and appoint the contractor. It is hoped the new steps will be in place next spring. *Judie Hodsdon*



Pittville Estate and the Gold Cup Meeting

In 2021, access by fans to the Festival race meeting was severely restricted because of Covid. In March 2022, record crowds of 280,627 racegoers attended over the four-day period. By the end of the event, almost four hundred complaints of antisocial behaviour (ASB) in Pittville Park, Evesham Road, New Barn Lane and tributary roads had been made to the Jockey Club. This massive increase in ASB has a serious impact on both residents and the Estate itself.

In April this year, Chris Nelson, the Police Complaints Commissioner, issued a press release which referred to this issue and particularly to complaints of men relieving themselves in public whilst on their way to and from the event. He said that this had been a regular problem, and was not a simple issue to solve. Alcohol is a major contributory factor, but the police are also concerned at the level of drug taking and dealing.

The Jockey Club have acknowledged that pedestrian access to the course and traffic congestion on surrounding roads are their biggest concern. The massive increase in complaints relates not only to ASB but also to the lack of portable toilets, too few rubbish bins, lack of stewards in evidence and limited police presence. They see these elements of the event as a shared responsibility between the racecourse and other authorities and agencies, and that finding a strategy to reduce the levels of concern is of the utmost urgency. The Jockey Club are conducting worldwide research as to how other venues with similar challenges deal with the situation, and intend to build their findings into a plan for 2023. Remedying the existing problems before the next Festival is one of their key goals.

A reported £100,000,000 revenue accrues to local businesses and to the racecourse over the four days of the Festival. It is not unreasonable to expect a more significant acknowledgement and that consideration be given to the fact that local residents and their environs bear the brunt of the footfall of many thousands which occurs for the most part on roads leading due north from the town centre.

Alex Chalk and both our local councillors, Stephan Fifield and Julian Tooke, attended a meeting at the racecourse last month which was chaired by Chris Nelson. The local situation in Pittville was one of the items on the agenda, but there won't be any firm proposals put forward until later in the year.

This is intended as a brief synopsis of events to date, as it is important that all Pittville residents



are aware of how matters progress, and we will endeavour to keep everyone updated.

Friends of Pittville is not a campaigning group. The aims as set down in our constitution are those of the preservation, improvement and conservation of the Pittville Estate. But the management of the vast numbers of people who move through Pittville on the way to and from the racecourse during the Festival is a legitimate concern for all of us who are affected by it.

Heritage Open Days

Friends of Pittville are managing three events to support Heritage Open Days. For the first, on Friday 9 and 16 September, meet in front of Pittville Pump Room at 10am. Robert Hyatt-Williams will lead a walk through Pittville Park, focusing on its history and trees. 'The walk starts at the Pump Room, where I shall give a short history of the project and the events surrounding it. However, the walk is mainly about the trees so we shall stop at some of the more interesting ones. Some are not indigenous and I will talk about their origins. At East Lake bridge, we pause to talk about Wymans Brook, which flows through the park and adds so much to it aesthetically.'



The second event involves visiting an underground chamber in front of Pittville Gates, from the late 1890s, which served as the transformer substation for the electrification of houses in the area. It also served the lamps on the Gates and possibly as a booster station for the electrified tram system. Climb down a (steep!) ladder to see inside the chamber!

When you have done that, walk up Prestbury Road to drop in at the paint shop next to Pittville Kitchens and Living Spaces, where members of the Pittville History Works group will be available with laptops to show you how to access some of the wealth of material on their website. Learn how to find out about the history of the Pittville Estate: house histories, residents and their occupations, schools, the origins of house names, and more. Both these events will take place on Saturday 10 September, between 11.00 and 13.00. There is no need to book.

Samaritan roses



The rose bed in the southeast corner of the Pump Room lawn was planted by the Samaritans to celebrate forty

years in Cheltenham and there is a plaque giving details. The bed is planted with a rose called the Samaritan Rose which was developed by Harkness Roses; a Hybrid Tea Rose blending peach, apricot and pink shades of petals with an orange centre and with a strong fragrance. The roses are looking particularly good this year and there are more at the gates with a plaque to celebrate the Samaritans having a presence in Cheltenham for fifty years.

Jubilee wildflowers

Cheltenham Borough Council planted wildflower seeds in the south-east corner of the Pump Room



lawn earlier this year - a mix of flowers similar to those planted for the Queen's Jubilee in the Tower of London moat. They have done very well and provided a great show of colour this summer as part of Jubilee celebrations.
