Refurbishment of the Scout Hut

Members may have noticed the one-storey dark green hut opposite Central Cross Café. This is home to the 10th Cheltenham (All Saints) Scout Group, one of the oldest groups in Cheltenham, founded in 1912. They decided to undertake a major refurbishment this year, and we at FoP were asked to send a letter supporting their application for a Cheltenham Zero grant — which was successful. Local firms donated materials, enabling a full makeover for the hut.



Work was done by volunteers, and Stephen Litchfield, one of our Green Space volunteers, was there every week helping them with insulation, plastering and

painting. He was joined by Karl Dubbink, David Byrne and our Park ranger, Lucy Wise, who

removed the overgrown shrubs outside and revealed the old flower bed which can now be planted.



The result looks great, and as a thank-you to FoP, we have been offered the refurbished hut for our trustees meetings, as well as for our annual plant sale. It is an excellent venue with a cheery meeting space, a kitchen, toilets and heating if needed, so we have accepted their kind offer. We hope to start with our next meeting in January 2023.

We are pleased to have a link with a group of young people, and look forward to the launch event for the hut in the coming weeks. We would like to thank Sarah Boulton, Nicole Sullivan and Mark Harris for keeping us involved. *Sally Thomas*

Green Space Volunteers

Wildflower seeds

Many of you may have noticed that the wildflower area to the east of Tommy Taylors Lane has been cut and scarified. At our working party on 20 October some of our Green Space Volunteers helped the CBC Green Space team, Glorious Cotswold Grasslands and the Mayor to spread what were estimated to be 100 million seeds over the area. The native Cotswold wildflower seeds were collected by Glorious Cotswold Grassland mainly from Leckhampton Hill and also from other similar sites in the Cotswolds. Even if only a small percentage of the seeds germinate they will make a great show and provide a home for pollinators, invertebrates and other wildlife.



It will hopefully provide the opportunity to create a seed bank in the future, harvesting in the autumn and spreading the seed in other areas of the town. FoP is preparing a habitat information board for the wildflower area with the CBC Green Space team, to educate and inspire visitors to Pittville Park about the benefits of wildflowers and all the wildlife that depends on them.

New tree planting



A local resident has over the years been growing native trees in pots in their garden and has now kindly donated the trees to Pittville Park. The trees range in height from 5 feet to 10 feet. Our Green

Space Volunteers collected the trees and recently planted them on the west side of Tommy Taylors Lane amongst a group of hawthorn and blackthorn bushes. This should make another interesting group of native trees in that area.

Other volunteers

Members of other charities and organisations sometimes come along to help FOP Green Space Volunteers work in the park and we have been very



pleased that Carol, Shania and Ross from St Vincent's and St George's (now renamed Aim Up) have been able to join us for the last few months. We have also had staff from GE Aviation, Spirax Serco and the P3 charity come along and help us with specific tasks.

The rockery

We continue to look after the west end of the rockery adjacent to the north side of the upper lake. This mainly involves weeding and pruning some of the shrubs, although it also involved watering some of the plants during the hottest spells in the summer.

A lot of clearance has been carried out on the east end of the rockery with the removal of some inappropriate trees, and some of the rocks have been retrieved from the lake and replaced in the rockery. The Green Space Volunteers will start further preparation in the new year, together with the CBC Green Space team, and new planting will hopefully start in April. *Chris Archibald*


The Pump Room Steps project

Since the last report there has been a bit of a delay because it proved difficult to find a landscape architect to take the Steps Project preparations forward. However, one has now been appointed, and an engineer too, so the work to prepare the documents to go out to tender is well underway. Another development is the signing of a legal agreement between CBC, FoP and Enovert Environmental Trust to ensure the payment of the grant in due course.

A new look for Pittville History Works

In October Pittville History Works launched its new-look website, with all the content of the former site, but with an elegant and simpler design.



At the moment the project team is preparing to transcribe the Pittville data from the newly released 1921 census, which will give us an idea of how Pittville emerged from the Great War. We are expecting to find a rise in multi-occupancy, and a more varied pattern of residency and occupations beginning to emerge. The picture below appeared in the *Cheltenham Chronicle and Gloucestershire Graphic* just three weeks before census night in 1921, and shows the old order at a Pittville garden party — did they know it was all about to change? Keep an eye on the site to see how the census project progresses.

Pittville Estate and the Gold Cup Meeting – an update

We ran an article in the September edition of the newsletter which highlighted the enormous increase in antisocial behaviour (ASB) in the Pittville area during the Gold Cup Week in March last year.

Complaints made by hundreds of residents have resulted in the Jockey Club introducing initiatives which they anticipate will go a considerable way to resolving the situation. The *Love Our Turf* campaign has been co-ordinated with the Racecourse, the police and local businesses, and was trialled at the race meeting of 11–13 November. The campaign will be launched in full at the Festival Meeting in March. Particular focus is being placed on the Evesham Road route between Cheltenham town centre and the course, with stewards, enhanced street cleaning, more rubbish bins and increased toilet facilities being deployed.

Andre Klein, Cheltenham Racecourse's Community Engagement Manager, said 'We absolutely recognise the feedback from members of the local community and racegoers that there was a need to enhance the experience of pedestrians arriving and departing from the racecourse and we hope that *Love Our Turf* will go some way to delivering it. Additional stewards, as well as the provision of more facilities and amenities, should alleviate many of the concerns raised by our local residents. We are really excited about this new initiative and know we will learn plenty from our experience on Saturday [12 November] that we can take forward to March, to ensure that the negative impact our events have on the community are massively reduced.'

First-hand comments as to the success of this plan are favourable. What stood out was the significant police presence at the junction of every tributary road on both sides of Evesham Road from the racecourse roundabout to West Approach Drive.

Increased parking restrictions were in place both on the Evesham Road and on New Barn Lane: cones were in place on either side of the road in New Barn Lane (from Lexington Square), and on Evesham Road from the roundabout to Central Cross Drive. All the lay-by sections on these roads, which are always occupied during Festival week, were also cordoned off. More Portaloos were in place on Evesham Road, 12 in all; hopefully more in March.

Continuous heavyweight bollard sections were positioned in the centre of Evesham Road from the racecourse roundabout to West Approach Drive – this prevented pedestrians drifting across the main road and obstructing traffic.

Stewards were in evidence along the Evesham Road; however, there were fewer towards the south, and none were noted beyond Central Cross Drive. It seems that at last there is an acknowledgement of the impact made by around 260,000 racegoers flooding into the Pittville area over the four-day Festival period. The Jockey Club's programme has been supported by Chris Nelson, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Gloucestershire, together with a much-welcomed cross-party initiative from Cheltenham Borough Council. Both our local councillors, Stephan Fifield

and Julian Tooke, have been very proactive in promoting the interests of Pittville and its residents.

The exercise during the November meeting weekend was a trial. No doubt there will be further reviews before Festival week, and we will ensure as much information as possible is made available to our members in the March newsletter.
